6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Acharya Prafulla Chandra College after whom the college is named, wanted 'universal literacy, spoke of basic education and utility education'. He advocated the concept of empowerment of women; he wanted the development of indigenous industry by utilising the acumen of the educated youth. In the true spirit of Acharya Prafulla Chandra Roy, the college tried to propagate his ideas and motto illustrates 'Service, Knowledge, Sacrifice'. Higher education has witnessed a paradigm shift from elitist esotericism to common man's right to knowledge. The college is trying to adapt itself to this new way of thinking. The semi-urban location of the college caters to the need of the students who come from the grassroot level; some of them are even first level of learners. The college is trying hard to set a pedagogy goal that is less hectoring an instructional and more learners facilitating.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- A) It is out of the purview of the college to change syllabus of UG section, but the PG section of Physics and Electronic Science have changed their syllabi as per requirement.
- B) The Electronic Science department has inserted MATLAB, MATLAB/P SPICE and other simulation software in the curriculum.
- C) Physics included Astro-Physics and Cosmology in fourth semester of PG.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- A) The IQAC encourages ICT teaching at PG level. Few UG classes also depend on Web bassed teaching, Power point presentation.
- B) Insruments purchased by the money of DST FIST have improved the facilities in the laboratories.
- C) The Smart Room that has come up, enabling seminars and talks to be organised systematically.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- 1. The Test examination before the University examination and the college unit tests are steadfastly maintained.
- 2. The marks obtained by the students are discussed in result consideration meetings.
- 3. Students with low scores are brought to the attention of the departments
- 4. Parents are called for meetings after the college test examination

6.3.4 Research and Development

- 1.The research ambience in the college is boosted up with the purchase of new instruments from the DST FIST fund
- 2. The publication in journals has increased with the expansion of research work in the college.
- 3. The Research and Consultancy cell is sought to be formed with the teachers active in research. .

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

With the UGC fund more text and reference books have been purchased. The work of computerization of the library is 60% complete. Many more Departments have ICT enabled classrooms.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college has developed as an important educational institution in the district of North 24 parganas. Thanks to the incessant efforts of the Principal, Teachers and Office staff, the college has earned a name amongst the premiere institutions. The students of the college are polite, disciplined and selfless. They take part in extension activities and NSS whenever they are called. Character building and good behaviour are always emphasized by the teachers of the institution. Quite often the NSS units hold seminars and workshops on the life and personalities of eminent people of our country, so that the students are inspired by their ideals.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

There has been no faculty recruitment this year. Twelve non-teaching temporary staff positions have been filled up.

Computer Science, Electronic Science students are often recruited in industry which forms a bridge between the college and the industry. The college is trying to develop industry interaction by sending Advertising & Sales Promotion and Industrial Fish & Fisheries students through job training in different industries.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

Admission of students was carried on both by online and manually. After screening the application forms the Departments, publish a merit list. The selected students are called for counseling.
